GETTING PARENTS INVOLVED PERT The Difficult Parent Get the parent involved by: - Listening to the parent talk. - Dealing with the problem, not the emotion. - Using positive statements. Following up conversations. The MASTER Teacher

Ask participants this question: Have you experienced dealing with a difficult parent? What did you do?

When dealing with a difficult parent, you want the involvement of that parent, but on a reasonable and profitable level. The following suggestions are some ideas to help get him or her to the involvement stage.


Listen to the parent talk. Sometimes the parent needs to vent his or her feelings before be or she can progress. Unless the parent becomes abusive, simply wait until he or she has finished, and then acknowledge your awareness of the situation. Verbalize back to him or her what you think he or she said.

Deal with the problem, not the emotion. Find out what the parent wants or expects you to do about the situation. Then let him or her know what you can do.

Use positive statements. Positive statements will let the parent know you want his or ber involvement. Some positive phrases include: "What if we...," "Consider this idea...," or "I think it would be better if...." Sometimes the difficult parent has not stopped to think about alternatives or how to actually solve the problem.

Follow up conversations. You can do this with a note or phone call to keep communi-
